

Pigeon Creek Grant Funding Available for Hay and Pasture Plantings



The Steuben County Soil & Water Conservation District (SWCD) has <u>limited</u> funding available through our Great Lakes Commission (GLC) Pigeon Creek Sediment and Nutrient Reduction Grant. The funding can be used in the upper stretches of Pigeon, including the sub-watersheds of Pigeon Lake, Mud Creek, and Long Lake for the implementation of conservation practices to reduce the amount of sediment & nutrients entering Pigeon Creek (see area highlighted in green on map).

The only practice eligible for cost-share assistance is <u>hay and</u> <u>pasture plantings</u>. Plantings will need to be completed between August 1 and September 15, 2021, per Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) seeding requirements.

If you have an interest in this program, please contact the Steuben SWCD <u>as soon as possible</u>. The expedited deadline is necessary as this grant ends September 30, 2021. Funding has become available due to a recent contract cancellation.

CRP Continuous Enrollment Deadline

Anyone interested in enrolling in the Continuous Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) needs to contact the FSA Office as soon as possible. The signup deadline is August 6th!! Practices such as filter strips, windbreaks, wetland restorations, State Acres for Wildlife Enhancement (SAFE) trees and warm season grasses, and grassed waterways are eligible.

Organic Certification Cost-Share Program (OCCSP)

The Organic Certification Cost-Share Program (OCCSP) has opened. Producers and handlers of agricultural products who are obtaining or renewing their certification under the National Organic Program (NOP) may receive up to 50% of their certification costs paid during the program year, not to exceed \$500. Please contact FSA for details.

FSA Now Accepting Nominations for County **Committee Position**

If you live in the Northern townships of Steuben County (Millgrove, Jamestown, Fremont, or Clear Lake), and have always wanted to know how FSA operates, think about running for a position on the County Committee.

County Committee members assist in making decisions on how federal farm programs are administered locally. Agricultural producers who participate or cooperate in a USDA program, and reside in any of the listed townships, may be nominated for candidacy for the County Committee. A cooperating producer is someone who has provided information about their farming operation to FSA, even if they have not applied or received program benefits. Individuals may nominate themselves or others.

FSA encourages participation from all producers, big or small, especially socially disadvantaged groups, such as female farm owners and beginning farmers. All nomination forms for the 2021 election must be postmarked or received in the USDA Angola Service Center by AUGUST 2, 2021. Contact FSA for additional details.



Tri-State Partnership

A partnership project between Indiana, Michigan, and Ohio was recently awarded \$7.7 million to protect and enhance soil health, improve water quality, protect natural resources, and support landowners in the Western Lake Erin Basin (WLEB) watershed. For the next 5 years, this exciting partnership, called the "Tri-State Western Lake Erie Basin Collaboration", will focus on the headwaters of the WLEB in each of the three states.

Over 30 different organizations will work together on a variety

of projects to continue to improve soil health and water quality across the almost 7 million acres of land in the WLEB, with the goal of decreasing the frequency and severity of harmful algal blooms (HABs) in Lake Erie.

"In Indiana, the Tri-State WLEB Collaboration is going to focus on the headwaters of the Maumee River. The Maumee is a crucial source for Lake Erie. By focusing on the smaller streams surrounding Lake Erie we are better able to increase the water quality of the lake as a whole."

This is one of three Regional Conservation Partnership Programs (RCPP) that the United States Department of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA - NRCS) awarded in the WLEB watershed, totaling \$23.2 million. New State Record Set for Cover Crops



According to a recent conservation survey, Indiana farmers have set a conservation record this year by planting an estimated 1.5 million acres of overwinter living covers, the largest amount ever recorded by an Indiana Conservation Partnership survey.

Overwintering living covers (i.e. cover crops and small grains) are known for their environmental benefits. Cover crops and small grains help increase organic matter in the soil and improve overall soil health by adding living roots to the land more months of the year. Cover crops also improve water infiltration into the soil, while other covers, like legumes serve as natural fertilizers.

Although the conservation transect doesn't differentiate between cover crops & small grains (e.g., wheat), Indiana farmers typically plant fewer than 200,000 acres of small grains annually, so cover crops vastly dominate the 1.5 million estimated acres. With the exception of corn and soybeans, cover crops are planted on more acres than any other commodity crop in Indiana. Cover crops are typically planted in the fall after harvest; they protect the soil and keep roots in the ground through the winter, which improves soil health and helps filter water runoff.
