## Be "Salt Smart" This Winter: Safe Application for People, Pets, the Environment, and Wildlife



In de-icing season, a "less is more" approach best protects lakes and streams.



As winter begins to settle in, the need for safe and effective de-icing practices becomes crucial. While salt is a common choice for keeping walkways and driveways clear of ice, its application requires careful consideration. Using salt helps prevent slips and falls on icy surfaces, but extensive application of it can lead to environmental consequences and harm our furry friends.

#### **Environmental Impact**

Runoff and Soil Contamination: Large quantities of salt, which may contain chlorides, can wash off impervious surfaces like roads and driveways into local water bodies, leading to increased salinity levels. Once salt gets into the water, it is difficult to remove. Chloride, a key component of surface salt (along with sodium), is soluble, highly mobile in water, and at high concentrations, can be toxic to aquatic vegetation and wildlife.

Did you know one teaspoon of salt can permanently pollute five gallons of water? That's right, once the chloride is in our water, it is there for good, and continues to build up year after year.

<u>Soil Health:</u> High salt concentrations can impair soil structure and fertility. Elevated salinity levels can hinder plant growth, reduce biodiversity, and lead to the degeneration of local habitats.

# Be "Salt Smart" This Winter: Safe Application for People, Pets, the Environment, and Wildlife (continued from page 1)

#### **Protecting Pets and Wildlife**

Salt can be harmful to pets and local wildlife. Salt can cause paw irritation in pets and can be toxic if ingested. The consumption of even small amounts of de-icing salt can lead to gastrointestinal distress or more severe health issues.

#### **Keeping Pets Safe**

<u>Wash Paws After Walks:</u> If your pet walks on salted surfaces, rinse their paws after outdoor excursions to prevent irritation or ingestion of harmful residues.

Opt for Pet-Friendly Products: Look for de-icers specifically labeled as safe for pets. These products typically have lower toxicity and are less harmful to the environment

#### **Strategies for Responsible Application**

Evaluate Conditions: Before applying salt, monitor weather forecasts. If temperatures are expected to rise, it might be more effective to wait, as salt can wash away in rain or snowmelt, reducing its effectiveness and increasing environmental risks. I5°F and below is too cold for salt. Most salts stop working at this temperature. Use sand instead for traction, but remember, sand does not melt ice.

Using the Right Amount: A little goes a long way. Instead of dumping large quantities, sprinkle just enough salt to create a barrier on icy surfaces. This not only conserves resources but also minimizes runoff into soil and waterways. People often think using more salt means more melting and safer conditions, but this is not true. Around 12 ounces - roughly a coffee mug full - effectively treats a 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares (about 1,000 square feet).

<u>Target Key Areas:</u> Focus on high-traffic zones such as sidewalks, steps, and driveways. Using a targeted approach reduces the overall amount needed while ensuring safety where it is most critical.

Sweep Up Visible Salt on Dry Surfaces: Leftover salt is no longer doing any work and can be washed away into local waters. You can keep it and reuse later. Next time, cut back on the amount you use.

Educate Your Community: Share information about environmental and health impacts of excessive salt use with neighbors. Engaging with neighbors can promote a community wide effort to adopt safer practices.
